

PUBLIC RELATIONS:

IDENTITY THEFT AND SCAM EDUCATION CONTINUE TO BE VERY POPULAR AND REQUESTED CLASSES ARE GIVEN BY DETECTIVE SERGEANT LEROY GROSS.

OTHER PRESENTATIONS WERE GIVEN TO VARIOUS GROUPS COVERING TRAFFIC LAWS, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DUTIES OF A POLICE OFFICER, SEXUAL ASSAULT OR OTHER POLICE RELATED TOPICS AS REQUESTED. AT THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT WE FEEL IT IS NECESSARY TO BE INVOLVED WITH THE COMMUNITY AND INTERACT WITH THEM AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THAT.

POLICE DEPARTMENT TOURS-OFFERS THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME INFORMED ON THE OPERATION OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, DISPATCH CENTER AND CORRECTIONAL CENTER.

GAMING ENFORCEMENT:

THE DEPARTMENT'S GAMING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM WORKS TOWARDS THE GOAL OF ENSURING THAT THOSE WHO CONDUCT OR PLAY THE GAMES OF CHANCE IN JAMESTOWN ARE PROTECTED BY THE STATE GAMING RULES. TO ACCOMPLISH THESE GOALS THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, WORKING WITH THE STATE GAMING OFFICE, REVIEW COMPLAINTS OF GAMING VIOLATIONS.

BICYCLES:

IN 2012 THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 21 BICYCLE LICENSES SOLD. THERE WERE 21 BIKES REPORTED STOLEN WITH A TOTAL OF 49 ABANDONED OR STOLEN BIKES RECOVERED IN 2012. SEVERAL BIKES WERE SOLD TO THE PUBLIC AT COSTS RANGING FROM \$5.00 TO \$25.00 DEPENDING UPON THE CONDITION OF THE BICYCLE.

K-9 ACTIVITY:

K-9 ACTIVITIES REFER TO ANY CALL REQUESTING ASSISTANCE FROM THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT K-9 UNIT. REQUESTS CAN BE MADE AT ANYTIME FOR ASSISTANCE IN NARCOTIC SEARCHES OF VEHICLES, RESIDENCES, AND BUILDINGS, AREA SEARCHES FOR EVIDENCE OF A CRIME, AND TRACKING OF LOST PERSONS OR SUSPECTS IN CRIMES.

K-9 BLAZE, A BLACK LABRADOR RETRIEVER, IS STILL WITH THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT. HE HAS BEEN WITH THE DEPARTMENT SINCE AUGUST OF 2008. HE WAS PURCHASED THROUGH DONATIONS BY AREA RESIDENTS AND LOCAL BUSINESSES. K-9 BLAZE AND CORPORAL SID MANN WERE AGAIN INVOLVED WITH NATIONAL POLICE CANINE ASSOCIATION CERTIFICATION AND MEMBERSHIP. CERTIFICATION WAS HELD IN BISMARCK. CORPORAL MANN AND K-9 BLAZE ARE ASSIGNED TO THE UNIFORM DIVISION WORKING 11PM TO 7AM.

CORPORAL MANN AND K-9 BLAZE COMPLETED 13 CALLS FOR SERVICE INCLUDING 2 SEARCHES AT THE JAMESTOWN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, 3 SEARCHES AT THE JAMES RIVER CORRECTIONAL CENTER, , 1 SEARCH AT ELLENDALE PUBLIC SCHOOLS, 5 VEHICLE SEARCHES, AND 1 SUSPICIOUS PACKAGE. THE K-9 UNIT WAS INVOLVED IN THE ARRESTS OF 2 INDIVIDUALS FOR POSSESSION OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES AND/OR POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA. MOST NOTABLY ON THE MORNING OF FEBRUARY 25, 2012 K-9 BLAZE WAS UTILIZED ON A VEHICLE SEARCH ON THE 500 BLOCK OF 1ST AVE N. K-9 BLAZE SHOWED POSITIVE ODOR RESPONSE AND A SEARCH OF THE VEHICLE WAS CONDUCTED. THE SEARCH YIELDED METHAMPHETAMINE, SYNTHETIC MARIJUANA, AND DRUG PARAPHERNALIA.

2012 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

THE JUVENILE OFFICER OF THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT GAVE 62 PRESENTATIONS TO SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN IN 2012. THE FOLLOWING PROGRAMS WERE INCLUDED IN THOSE PRESENTATIONS.

MEET A POLICE OFFICER: STUDENTS MEET A POLICE OFFICER AND LEARN ABOUT GOOD CITIZENSHIP, RESPONSIBILITY AND THE DUTIES OF POLICE OFFICERS.

BEWARE OF STRANGERS: INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS ABOUT SAFETY WITH STRANGERS. TOPICS INCLUDE WHO A STRANGER IS, RIDES FROM STRANGERS AND GOOD AND BAD TOUCHES.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY: INSTRUCTIONS ON HALLOWEEN SAFETY RULES, TOPICS INCLUDE TRAFFIC SAFETY, COSTUMES, TREATS, STRANGER SAFETY AND HALLOWEEN COURTESY.

SHOPLIFTING PREVENTIONS: PROGRAM ABOUT THE CRIME OF SHOPLIFTING WITH A FOCUS ON DETERRING SHOPLIFTING. TOPICS INCLUDE WHAT IS SHOPLIFTING, WHY PEOPLE SHOPLIFT, STORE SECURITY, ARREST PROCEDURES AND COURTS.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL INFORMATION: AN INFORMATIVE LOOK AT THE DRUG, ALCOHOL, AND PRESCRIPTION DRUG PROBLEM IN THE JAMESTOWN AREA. TOPICS INCLUDE THE USE OF DRUGS AND ALCOHOL, LAWS, ARREST PROCEDURES AND COURTS.

CRIME PREVENTION: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH CRIME PREVENTION, CRIME DETECTION AND CRIME REPORTING. TOPICS INCLUDE THE JOB OF A POLICE OFFICER, HOW TO DETECT, PREVENT AND REPORT CRIMES.

BIKE SAFETY: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH SAFE BIKE RIDING. TOPICS INCLUDE BIKE TRAFFIC SAFETY RULES, ACCIDENT PREVENTION, LOCKING AND LICENSING BIKES.

CHILD FIND FINGERPRINT PROGRAM: FINGERPRINTS SERVE AS A POSITIVE MEANS OF IDENTIFYING MISSING CHILDREN. THE PROGRAM ASSISTS IN THE FINGERPRINTING OF CHILDREN, WITH THE PRINTS GIVEN TO THE PARENT, NOT KEPT AT THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

HOME ALONE SAFETY: REVIEWS THE SAFETY SKILLS CHILDREN NEED WHEN THEY ARE HOME ALONE. TOPICS INCLUDE CRIME PREVENTION, FIRE PREVENTION, FIRST AID AND THE USE OF EMERGENCY PHONE NUMBER 911.

CRIMINAL LAW: A REVIEW OF SELECTED LAWS AND THEIR METHOD OF ENFORCEMENT. TOPICS INCLUDE THE ARREST PROCESS AND A DISCUSSION OF SEARCH AND SEIZURE.

CAREER GUIDANCE CLASSES: AN INFORMATIVE LOOK AT A CAREER IN LAW ENFORCEMENT, TOPICS INCLUDE THE DUTIES OF A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS, HIRING PROCESS AND CAREER OUTLOOK.

CHILD CARE TRAINING: A REVIEW OF SAFETY TECHNIQUES USED WHEN BABYSITTING. TOPICS INCLUDE CHILD CARE MANAGEMENT, ON THE JOB SAFETY AND FIRST AID AND EMERGENCY PROCEDURES.

DRIVERS EDUCATION CLASS: A DISCUSSION FOCUSING ON THE VEHICLE TRAFFIC SYSTEM. TOPICS INCLUDE ACCIDENT PREVENTION, TRAFFIC LAW AND SAFE VEHICLE OPERATION.

SCHOOL PROGRAMS CONTINUED:

CRIMINAL COURTS SYSTEM: A DISCUSSION OF THE ADULT AND JUVENILE COURT SYSTEMS. TOPICS FOCUS ON JUVENILE AND ADULT CRIMES, JUVENILE AND ADULT ARREST PROCEDURES AND THE JUVENILE AS WELL AS ADULT COURT SYSTEMS.

CRIME PREVENTION TRADING CARD PROGRAM: THE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES ITS PARTICIPATION IN THIS WORTHWHILE CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAM. DURING THE BASEBALL SEASON, EACH OFFICER RECEIVES MINNESOTA TWINS CARDS TO HAND OUT TO THE YOUTH OF JAMESTOWN. THE PROGRAM CONTINUES TO DEVELOP POSITIVE CONTACT BETWEEN OUR OFFICERS AND THE YOUTH OF OUR CITY.

ARSON AWARENESS PROGRAM: AN INFORMATIVE LOOK AT THE DANGERS INVOLVED IN THE MISUSE OF LIGHTERS AND MATCHES. STUDENTS ARE REMINDED THAT MATCHES AND LIGHTERS ARE DANGEROUS TOOLS AND WHEN THEY ARE MISUSED, THEY CAN CAUSE INJURY, DEATH AND THE DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY. STUDENTS ARE ADVISED TO RECEIVE PROPER INSTRUCTION ON HOW TO USE MATCHES AND LIGHTERS FROM AN ADULT. EXAMPLES OF THE MISUSE OF FIRE ARE GIVEN ALONG WITH SAFETY INFORMATION ON HOW TO PREVENT FIRES.

SEATBELT SAFETY: A DISCUSSION ON WHY SEATBELTS ARE IMPORTANT AND HOW TO USE THEM PROPERLY.

4TH AMENDMENT SEARCH & SEIZURE: A LOOK AT THE 4TH AMENDMENT LAW AND THE MISCONCEPTIONS ASSOCIATED WITH IT.

The Second half of the 2011-12 school year was relatively quiet with fewer incidents than the first half. From January 2012 to May 2012 there were only 16 incidents which added up to 45 for the year. The main goal of the program was and always will be to bridge the gap between the police department and the kids and to also improve preventive measures to reduce incidents. The work paid off once again in 2012 with a reduced amount of incidents and activity totals once again going up. I feel the gap is closing more every year and I am starting to see the increased preventive measures starting to work. The text a tip program is also gaining speed with an increased number of students using the program. I received text messages in 2012 the stopped underage drinking and drug use without anyone's name being used. I am also seeing an increased number of students in my office in the time that I am there.

In the first half of the 2012-13 school year the numbers were about the same as the second half of 2011-12. There were also 16 incidents that occurred. The activity totals are up again and the preventive measures are helping to keep the numbers down. I am still working a lot out of school to prevent things from being brought into school. I have made an increased number of home visits which does decrease the amount of incidents that occur at school. The five minute talks with students of all ages whether it is at home or before school starts in the morning works wonders. The counselors also call me and tell me about students and what they are dealing with. I have been working with the counselors more and more each year and that has also been a great preventive tool. Once again this year not every student that I get a call on gets a referral. I have given students a break on many occasions and it has paid off for me later on with the information that I get from them. These kids are still learning from their mistakes and a break goes a long way in building trust.

In 2012 I was also asked to join the SARB team on the district level. SARB stands for the student attendance review board. There is a monthly meeting with administration, counselors and social services to discuss attendance issues with students. After we decide if the student and the parent needs to be referred to social services and the police social services and myself take the case. We work together to see if the parent is at fault for educational neglect or if the student is being unruly. These cases are very time consuming and can take a month or more to complete. I am also being used by the administration for cases that normally would not involve the police but will prevent incidents from occurring later on. The administration trusts my judgment and we have learned to work well together. Things like this do not make it on the stat sheet for the end of the year but play a big part in the number of incidents declining.

Since the SRO program was started in 2009 there has been a steady decrease in the amount of incidents and a steady increase in the amount of activity hours. In the 2009-10 school year there were 136 incidents and only about 40 activity hours. In the 2010-11 school year there were 59 incidents and 155 activity hours. In the 2011-12 school year there were 45 incidents and 228 activity hours. As you can see the incidents keep dropping and the activity totals keep increasing. I expect the number of incidents to plateau at some point because no matter what you do it will never get to zero. I still attend sporting events such as football, hockey, basketball, volleyball and baseball. I attend these events for many reasons. I am asked by students, parents and staff to attend them. I also attend them to make myself visible and to show the kids that I support them. I also attend the events for safety reasons and with all

the violence recently and the number of people at the events I feel that it is a good idea for the police department to be there.

My prevention programs in the schools are more and bigger than they have ever been. I teach Fourth Amendment rights in the 9th grade Civics classes. It gives the kids a chance to ask about search and seizure and what rights they have. It also gives them a chance to talk about anything else that is on their mind. I teach seat belt safety in the third grade classrooms. The class teaches the kids how important seat belts are and why they should wear them. The D.A.R.E. program is by far the biggest program I teach in all the schools. It all starts in Kindergarten where I talk to the kids about summer safety. We talk for about 30 minutes about bike safety, crosswalks and having a buddy system when playing outside. This is also an introduction to me and what I do in the schools. The next grade I see in the fifth grade. This is the core program for D.A.R.E. and it is one hour a week for nine weeks. This program focuses on peer pressure, bullying, resistance strategies, stress and making good and healthy choices. I give away things with the D.A.R.E. logo on them such as footballs and basketballs to remind them of what was taught and to make it fun. The program is very interactive to keep their attention and is used by 75% of the schools in the United States. I also give each student a t-shirt with the D.A.R.E. logo on it at the end of the program. I teach the sixth grade class next. This D.A.R.E. program is about bullying and the effects of bullying. The class doesn't focus on preventing the bully from picking on people but focuses more on teaching the bullied how to react. It has been proven more effective to teach it that way. I also teach a D.A.R.E. class in the ninth grade that focuses on RX/OTC medications. There is a misconception at the high school and middle school that it is ok to take prescription drugs that are not yours and I am trying to change that. The D.A.R.E. program is a lot of work with fundraising, planning, scheduling and teaching it. It does take up a lot of time but I feel that it is well worth the effort.

The SRO program continues to grow every year and I seem to get busier every year. The amount of work put into the program and the proactive approach have made a big difference in the incident numbers going down. I expect them to plateau in the next few years but with what looks like lower numbers in the 2012-13 school year it keeps getting better. I will continue to grow the program and make it the best SRO program in the state.

RECORDS SECTION:

2012 WAS ANOTHER BUSY YEAR FOR THE RECORDS SECTION.

REPORTABLE CRIMES (THOSE THAT ARE REPORTED TO THE FBI) WERE UP FROM 1,317 IN 2012 AS COMPARED TO 1,017 IN 2011 AND 1,040 IN 2010. DOMESTIC ASSAULTS WERE UP IN 2012 WITH 96 AS COMPARED TO 78 IN 2011, WHERE AS SIMPLE ASSAULTS WERE DOWN FROM 91 IN 2011 TO 88 IN 2012. DRUG VIOLATIONS REPORTED ARE UP WITH AN INCREASE OF 223 VIOLATIONS IN 2012 AS COMPARED TO 161 IN 2011. A COUPLE MAJOR INCREASES WERE POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA WENT FROM 83 IN 2011 TO 124 IN 2012 AND POSSESSION OF MARIJUANA WENT FROM 54 IN 2011 TO 68 IN 2012. ALL REPORTED THEFTS COMBINED WERE UP FROM 351 IN 2011 TO 494 IN 2012. THE MOST NOTED CHANGES WERE THEFT OF PROPERTY OFFENSES WERE UP BY 36, AND THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLE OFFENSES WERE UP BY 32 AND BURGLARIES WERE UP BY 37 IN 2012. OTHER INDIVIDUAL CATEGORIES OF CRIMES REPORTED WERE ONCE AGAIN VERY COMPARABLE TO THE NUMBER OF REPORTS RECEIVED IN 2011.

ADULT CRIMINAL ARRESTS ARE UP FROM 1,164 IN 2011 TO 1,344 IN 2012, AN INCREASE OF 180. THE LARGEST INCREASE WAS IN CONTEMPT OF COURT ARRESTS WITH A TOTAL INCREASE OF 136 ARRESTS IN 2012 AS COMPARED TO 73 IN 2011. THERE WAS ALSO A NOTED INCREASE IN DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE ARRESTS WHICH WERE UP 35 IN 2012, POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA WAS UP BY 36 IN 2012 AND MINOR IN CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL ARRESTS WHICH WERE UP BY 23 IN 2012. THE OTHER CRIMINAL ARREST CATEGORY NUMBERS WERE COMPARABLE BETWEEN THE YEARS 2011 AND 2012.

JUVENILE REFERRALS WERE UP FROM 359 IN 2011 COMPARED TO 367 IN 2012. THE LARGEST INCREASES WERE IN CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL BY MINOR REFERRALS WHICH WENT FROM 13 IN 2011 UP TO 40 IN 2012, A DIFFERENCE OF 27 REFERRALS. OTHER NOTED INCREASES IN 2012 WERE CRIMINAL MISCHIEF REFERRALS WERE UP 32, CRIMINAL TRESPASSING REFERRALS WERE UP 14 AND UNRULY JUVENILE REFERRALS WERE UP 7 IN 2012. THE LARGEST DECREASE IN REFERRALS WAS IN THE THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLE WHICH WAS 83 IN 2011 AND 14 REFERRALS IN 2012. TOTAL REFERRALS FOR THEFT CHARGES WENT FROM 123 IN 2011 TO 47 IN 2012, A DECREASE OF 76. REFERRALS FOR ASSAULT CHARGES WENT FROM 23 IN 2011 TO 20 IN 2012, A DECREASE OF 3. REFERRALS FOR SEX CRIMES ARE UP, 5 IN 2012 AS COMPARED TO 1 IN 2011.









JAMES-VALLEY SPECIAL OPERATIONS TEAM

END OF YEAR REPORT FOR 2012

The James-Valley Special Operations Team (J-V S.O.T.) saw a few changes during 2012. The most noticeable change was having Sgt. Scott Edinger step down as team commander, as he was appointed to his new position as Chief of Police. To fill the vacancy, Sgt. Justin Blinsky was appointed as interim commander of the team. The appointment is still in effect, until such time as all department heads from each agency which are a part of the team, can get together to make a permanent appointment.

Most of the team personnel from the Jamestown Police Department remained the same, but some individual assignments on the team changed. Jameson Overvold was unanimously appointed to the team, while he was with the Jamestown Police Department. Overvold attended SWAT basic with Officer Germain, so both officers understand the basics of SWAT principles and tactics. Officer Overvold switched employment to the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, during the year, but still remains on the team as a member from the Sheriff's Office. Cpl Robert Schlenvogt stepped down as lead sniper for the team, but remains on the team as an entry operator and assistant team leader. Officer Germain also attended basic sniper training, during this year. Upon completion of both trainings, Officer Germain was designated to sniper on the team.

One new member was added to the Negotiations Team during 2012 from the Jamestown Police Department. Officer Darcy Anderson attended basic negotiations training and is assigned as an alternate on the negotiations team. Officer Darcy Anderson attempts to train monthly with the James River Correctional Center Crisis Negotiations Team. She will continue to train and gain experience, so she her Negotiator capabilities can be used when needed. Currently, the negotiations team from J.R.C.C. assists our team during those callouts, when negotiators are needed. They are utilized under an agreement with the Barnes County Sheriff's Office, as they are employed as "Special Deputies", when their services are needed.

The Jamestown Police Department currently has 6 members, 1 alternate, 1 negotiator, and 1 secretary assigned to the team.

The Stutsman County Sheriff's Office (S.C.S.O.) also saw some team personnel changes. As stated above, Jameson Overvold remains with the team. Sgt. Ramone Gumke was also added to the team as a team sniper, after completing basic sniper training. Both of these positions were added positions for the Sheriff's Office, who currently have 4 members assigned to the team. Deputy Casey Yunck accepted the position of lead sniper and currently supervises all snipers and reports activities to the team commander.

The Valley City Police Department (V.C.P.D.) saw a couple of changes this year. At the end of last year, it was reported Officer Cody Thibert was going to be added as a team member from their department. This did not happen, so they still have 2 openings to fill from their agency. Officer Pat Sand left their department to take a position with the Barnes County Sheriff's Office. Pat remains a member of the team from the Barnes County Sheriff's Office. Valley City Police Department currently has 3 members on the team, including Officer Steve Loibl, who is an Assistant Team Commander. The Barnes County Sheriff's Office currently has 1 team member on the team.

The composition of the team includes the following: 14 tactical officer (Command, Entry, Sniper, and Chemical Munitions), 1 alternate, 6 negotiators, 1 Secretary, and a tactical medic. Under the existing agreement, primary command of the team still falls under the Jamestown Police Department. Funding responsibility falls on each agency to provide equipment and training for their respective officers or, if available, Federal Law Enforcement Grants for team equipment.

Currently, the J-V S.O.T. is a North Dakota Peace Officers Association Special Operations Committee (N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C.) certified team. There are strict requirements which must be adhered to, in order to remain a certified team. These requirements include: number of team members, having a negotiations team, specialized training to SWAT, minimum number of training hours, and equipment requirements. The J-V S.O.T. continues to meet these requirements, which is an asset to our community and surrounding area. By being a certified team, the J-V S.O.T. can be called upon to assist our department or surrounding agencies in critical situations. Those situations can include: armed and barricaded subjects, high-risk search/arrest warrants, hostage situations, and search/rescue for victims, suspects, or dangerous offenders. We primarily will be called upon in a surrounding 9 county area, which is our main responsibility area, if needed. If we travel outside the jurisdiction of any participating agency of the team, we are eligible to receive reimbursement for the expenses occurred by the team/agencies. This reimbursement can include wages, mileage, food, lodging, and equipment expense. The N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C. provides training and training funds to certified teams.

The focus for this year was to continue on providing quality specialized training unique to SWAT teams and enhance further team cohesion. Sgt. Justin Blinsky, Major Jason Falk (S.C.S.O) and Officer Steve Loibl (V.C.P.D.) all attended a nationally and state recognized specialized training for "SWAT COMMAND STAFF and DECISION MAKING" training, in Minneapolis, MN. This training is hosted through the National Tactical Officers Association and is instructed by expert-type instructors in the area of SWAT. This training helps attendees understand current court decisions, liability issues, training issues, and concepts/decisions faced by Team leaders

and Commanders, regarding SWAT teams. As previously stated, other members attended several other trainings throughout the year.

Also mentioned before was the requirement to have a minimum of 96 hours of team training each year (1-eight hour training per month). This year we continued to develop difficult curriculums for team trainings, so team members were challenged. By doing this, it helped develop unity and cohesion with newer members of the team. We continue to alternate training sites between Jamestown, Valley City, and rural farm sites and ranges.

Equipment was also a priority when looking at what immediate needs the team is required to possess. A negotiations throw phone was purchased in late 2011 by grant money awarded to the Police Department. The throw phone was received in 2012 and has been utilized. It provides a very beneficial asset, when the need to communicate with suspects arises. Another grant was applied for through the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services. The team was only able to apply for this grant because we are a certified regional response SWAT team. The team was awarded grant money to buy a remote robot. This robot gives us the ability to deploy a machine into a harmful environment, instead of deploying officers and jeopardizing their safety. Currently, we are in the process of ordering the robot.

During 2012, the James-Valley Special Operations Team was activated 5 times.

On 02/01/12, 1422 hrs., a partial team activation was made to assist with the destroying of 2 mortar rounds and a hand grenade, which were held as evidence for many years. Bismarck Bomb Squad researched the materials and spoke to E.O.D., in Minot. It appeared all the materials were empty. The mortar rounds and grenade body posed a possible threat, so the decision was made to destroy them. The materials were transported to the old landfill east of Jamestown. Bismarck Bomb completely disintegrated the material, to eliminate any threat the material posed.

On 05/07/12, at 0950 hrs., a full team activation was made to help search, locate, and capture an escaped sex offender from the high security area of the North Dakota State Hospital. While the team was responding, several patrol units and other agencies responded to the location. The subject was observed running in a specific area and was taken into custody, at approximately 1000 hrs. The team was still responding when the subject was taken into custody. However, some team members had made it to the location and assisted in taking the subject into custody.

On 05/10/12, at 1112 hrs., a partial team activation was made to assist in destroying some unknown, possibly unstable, material, chemicals, and compounds which were left in a vacated storage garage. The Fargo Bomb Squad was notified and responded to properly destroy the

abandoned material. The material was transported to the old landfill east of Jamestown. Fargo Bomb completely disintegrated the material, to eliminate any safety risks the material posed.

On 08/11/12, at 0203 hrs., a full team activation was made to respond and assist the McIntosh County Sheriff's Office, with an incident in Ashley, ND. The activation was made for an intoxicated male who was armed with a gun and was making threats someone was going to die. The suspect had his wife and children inside the home with him, creating a hostage situation. The team began to respond. The suspect allowed his family to leave the house and was taken into custody by the deputies at the scene, before we were able to arrive.

On 10/20/12, at 0156 hrs., a partial team activation was made to respond and assist the Jamestown Police Department patrol division with an incident in Jamestown. A male subject was threatening to hurt himself or someone else and was armed with a knife. Patrol Officers were talking to the subject, but he was refusing to come out of a building. By activating certain specialized team members, it provided officers with more options on how to take the subject into custody, by use of less lethal weapons. It also provided more scene security. The subject was taken into custody for a mental health exam, prior to team members arriving.

We continue to look forward to providing a critical service when needed in Jamestown and surrounding areas.

STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2012

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy Jamey Overvold, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 5 months, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 5 years and is stationed in Barnes County. Officer Mike Lucht, with the Jamestown Police Department, has been assigned to the Task Force and has been a member for 2 years. Special Agent Arnie Rummel, with the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigations, was supervising the Task Force and has been doing so for 22 years. As of March 2013 Special Agent Troy Kelly become the new supervisor of the Task Force. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 106 cases in 2012, which was up from 85 cases in 2011, 79 cases in 2010 and 62 cases in 2009. The Task Force initiated 67 cases and assisted other agencies with 39 cases. The Task Force had 17 arrests, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2012, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 153 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$61,200. Task Force also continues to see a rise in synthetic drugs with approximately 36 grams of synthetic drugs being seized.

In 2012, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 191 grams of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$23,875. This number is up from 45.25 grams in 2011, 8.5 grams in 2010 and 5 grams in 2009. The Task Force conducted 2 cases where a methamphetamine laboratory or equipment to manufacture methamphetamine was seized. Methamphetamine use has again shown a dramatic increase in our area and is one of the more prevalent drugs that the Task Force has been fighting.

In 2012, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 266 dosage units of various prescription controlled substances including morphine, fentanyl, oxycodone, hydrocodone, tramadol, and various others. Prescription drug abuse continues to be an ongoing trend in our area and across the state.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force.

In summary, in 2012 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 106 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, synthetics, and prescription controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

2012 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:

IN 2012, THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 1167 CALLS PERTAINING TO ANIMALS. THE MAJORITY OF THESE CALLS WERE TO COMPLAIN ABOUT ANIMALS AT LARGE OR BEING A NUISANCE. 24 OF THESE CALLS WERE REGARDING PEOPLE BEING BITTEN BY ANIMALS. 8 CALLS WERE TO INVESTIGATE CRUELTY TO ANIMALS. THESE CALLS, ALONG WITH ROUTINE PATROL, RESULTED IN 197 ANIMALS BEING IMPOUNDED. THESE ANIMALS WERE HANDLED AS FOLLOWS:
