PUBLIC RELATIONS:

IDENTITY THEFT AND SCAM EDUCATION CONTINUE TO BE VERY POPULAR AND REQUESTED CLASSES ARE GIVEN BY DETECTIVE SERGEANT LEROY GROSS.

OTHER PRESENTATIONS WERE GIVEN TO VARIOUS GROUPS COVERING TRAFFIC LAWS, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DUTIES OF A POLICE OFFICER, SEXUAL ASSAULT OR OTHER POLICE RELATED TOPICS AS REQUESTED. AT THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT WE FEEL IT IS NECESSARY TO BE INVOLVED WITH THE COMMUNITY AND INTERACT WITH THEM AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THAT.

POLICE DEPARTMENT TOURS-OFFERS THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME INFORMED ON THE OPERATION OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, DISPATCH CENTER AND CORRECTIONAL CENTER.

GAMING ENFORCEMENT:

THE DEPARTMENT'S GAMING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM WORKS TOWARDS THE GOAL OF ENSURING THAT THOSE WHO CONDUCT OR PLAY THE GAMES OF CHANCE IN JAMESTOWN ARE PROTECTED BY THE STATE GAMING RULES. TO ACCOMPLISH THESE GOALS THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, WORKING WITH THE STATE GAMING OFFICE, REVIEW COMPLAINTS OF GAMING VIOLATIONS.

BICYCLES:

IN 2013 THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 13 BICYCLE LICENSES SOLD. THERE WERE 19 BIKES REPORTED STOLEN WITH A TOTAL OF 47 ABANDONED OR STOLEN BIKES RECOVERED IN 2013.

K-9 ACTIVITY:

K-9 ACTIVITIES REFER TO ANY CALL REQUESTING ASSISTANCE FROM THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT K-9 UNIT. REQUESTS CAN BE MADE AT ANYTIME FOR ASSISTANCE IN NARCOTIC SEARCHES OF VEHICLES, RESIDENCES, AND BUILDINGS, AREA SEARCHES FOR EVIDENCE OF A CRIME, AND TRACKING OF LOST PERSONS OR SUSPECTS IN CRIMES.

K-9 BLAZE, A BLACK LABRADOR RETRIEVER, IS STILL WITH THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT. HE HAS BEEN WITH THE DEPARTMENT SINCE AUGUST OF 2008. HE WAS PURCHASED THROUGH DONATIONS BY AREA RESIDENTS AND LOCAL BUSINESSES. CORPORAL MANN AND K-9 BLAZE ARE ASSIGNED TO THE UNIFORM DIVISION WORKING 7PM TO 7AM.

CORPORAL MANN AND K-9 BLAZE COMPLETED 16 CALLS FOR SERVICE INCLUDING 1 SEARCH AT THE JAMESTOWN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, 2 SEARCHES AT THE JAMES RIVER CORRECTIONAL CENTER, 1 SEARCH OF THE STUTSMAN COUNTY JAIL, 4 VEHICLE SEARCHES, AND 4 SEARCHES AT RESIDENCES . THE K-9 UNIT WAS INVOLVED IN THE ARRESTS OF 6 INDIVIDUALS FOR POSSESSION OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES AND/OR POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA. MOST NOTABLY ON THE EVENING OF MARCH 13, 2012 K-9 BLAZE WAS UTILIZED ON A VEHICLE SEARCH IN THE PARKING LOT OT HOLIDAY INN EXPRESS. K-9 BLAZE SHOWED POSITIVE ODOR RESPONSE. A SEARCH WARRANT WAS GRANTED AND A SEARCH OF THE VEHICLE WAS CONDUCTED. THE SEARCH YIELDED COCAINE, PRESCRIPTION PILLS, AND DRUG PARAPHERNALIA. THE PERSON RESPONSIBLE WAS CHARGED WITH POSSESSION WITH INTENT TO DISTRIBUTE DUE TO THE QUANTITIES AND MANNER OF PACKAGING INVOLVED.

2013 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

THE JUVENILE OFFICER OF THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT GAVE 70 PRESENTATIONS TO SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN IN 2013. THE FOLLOWING PROGRAMS WERE INCLUDED IN THOSE PRESENTATIONS.

MEET A POLICE OFFICER: STUDENTS MEET A POLICE OFFICER AND LEARN ABOUT GOOD CITIZENSHIP, RESPONSIBILITY AND THE DUTIES OF POLICE OFFICERS.

BEWARE OF STRANGERS: INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS ABOUT SAFETY WITH STRANGERS. TOPICS INCLUDE WHO A STRANGER IS, RIDES FROM STRANGERS AND GOOD AND BAD TOUCHES.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY: INSTRUCTIONS ON HALLOWEEN SAFETY RULES, TOPICS INCLUDE TRAFFIC SAFETY, COSTUMES, TREATS, STRANGER SAFETY AND HALLOWEEN COURTESY.

CRIME PREVENTION: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH CRIME PREVENTION, CRIME DETECTION AND CRIME REPORTING. TOPICS INCLUDE THE JOB OF A POLICE OFFICER, HOW TO DETECT, PREVENT AND REPORT CRIMES.

BIKE SAFETY: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH SAFE BIKE RIDING. TOPICS INCLUDE BIKE TRAFFIC SAFETY RULES, ACCIDENT PREVENTION, LOCKING AND LICENSING BIKES.

HOME ALONE SAFETY: REVIEWS THE SAFETY SKILLS CHILDREN NEED WHEN THEY ARE HOME ALONE. TOPICS INCLUDE CRIME PREVENTION, FIRE PREVENTION, FIRST AID AND THE USE OF EMERGENCY PHONE NUMBER 911.

CRIME PREVENTION TRADING CARD PROGRAM: THE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES ITS PARTICIPATION IN THIS WORTHWHILE CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAM. DURING THE BASEBALL SEASON, EACH OFFICER RECEIVES MINNESOTA TWINS CARDS TO HAND OUT TO THE YOUTH OF JAMESTOWN. THE PROGRAM CONTINUES TO DEVELOP POSITIVE CONTACT BETWEEN OUR OFFICERS AND THE YOUTH OF OUR CITY.

ARSON AWARENESS PROGRAM: AN INFORMATIVE LOOK AT THE DANGERS INVOLVED IN THE MISUSE OF LIGHTERS AND MATCHES. STUDENTS ARE REMINDED THAT MATCHES AND LIGHTERS ARE DANGEROUS TOOLS AND WHEN THEY ARE MISUSED, THEY CAN CAUSE INJURY, DEATH AND THE DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY. STUDENTS ARE ADVISED TO RECEIVE PROPER INSTRUCTION ON HOW TO USE MATCHES AND LIGHTERS FROM AN ADULT. EXAMPLES OF THE MISUSE OF FIRE ARE GIVEN ALONG WITH SAFETY INFORMATION ON HOW TO PREVENT FIRES.

The second half of the 2012-13 school year was busier than the first half. From January 2013 to May 2013 there were 21 incidents which added up to 37 for the year. So far every year since the SRO program has been started the incidents have gone down in number with 37 being the lowest. The main goal of the program is to bridge the gap between the students and the police department. The other goal is to improve preventive measures and to reduce incidents. Every year I can see the increased preventive measures working and the incidents going down. The text a tip program is still going strong with increased usage from the students. I am getting tips that range from alcohol and drug use to an assault that is about to happen. I still have a steady flow of students coming into my office asking questions and to report things that are happening.

In the first half of the 2013-14 school year the numbers were around the same again with 15 incidents. The activity totals are up again and the preventive measures are helping to keep the numbers low. I am working more and more every year out of school to make sure problems are not brought into school. I make home visits when requested and scan Facebook for what happened during the weekend. This decreases the number of incidents being brought to school. A five minute talk with a student before school in the morning works to diffuse most situations. The counselors also call me and tell me about students and what they are dealing with. I work with the counselors a lot each year and it is a great preventive tool. Like every other year not every student that I talk too gets a referral. I have the option of giving the student a break like a regular patrolman off the street may not have. I know more about the students and can make the determination if a referral will help or make things worse. Giving breaks also pays off by getting information that I need at a later date. The kids are learning from their mistakes and a break goes a long way in building trust.

I am still a member of the SARB team on the District level. SARB is the student attendance review board. There is a monthly meeting with administration, counselors, social services, states attorney's office and myself to discuss attendance issues. We all work together to decide who is at fault for the attendance issues, the student or the parent. The investigation is very time consuming and requires a lot of cooperation from the parents which is sometimes hard to get. The administration trusts my judgment and we work well together.

This year is the first year of Juvenile Drug Court in Stutsman County. I am involved in that as a representative from the police department. Juvenile's get recommended from the juvenile officers and have to fit the criteria for being in the program. The team meets every Wednesday to discuss how the juvenile has done during the week. The juvenile is given things to accomplish during the week and if they do the tasks they are rewarded. The juvenile's are in the program for a year and can graduate out of it. If they fail the tasks they are punished all the way up to being kicked out of the program and being sent away.

Since the SRO program started in 2009 the incident numbers have been decreasing every year. In the 2009-10 school year there were 136 incidents and only 40 activity hours. During the 2012-13 school year there were 37 incidents and 225 activity hours. I expect the 2013-14 school year to have even lower numbers and higher activity hours. I still attend sporting events such as football, hockey, basketball, volleyball and baseball. I attend these events for many reasons. I am asked by students,

parents and staff to attend them. I also attend them to make myself visible and to show the kids I support them. I also attend the events for safety reasons and with all the school violence in the past 15 years I feel it is important for the police department to be visible.

My prevention programs in the schools are as big as they have ever been. I teach 4th Amendment rights in the 9th grade civics classes. It gives the kids a chance to ask about search and seizure and the rights that they have. I teach seat belt safety in the 3rd grade classrooms. The class teaches the kids how important seat belt use is and why they should wear them. The D.A.R.E. program is by far the biggest program I teach in all the schools. It starts in Kindergarten where I talk to the kids about summer safety. We talk for around 30 minutes about bike safety, crosswalks and being with a buddy when playing outside. This is also in introduction to me and what I do in the schools. The next grade I see is 5th grade. This is the core program for D.A.R.E. and the class is one hour a week for nine weeks. The program focuses on peer pressure, bullying, resistance strategies, stress and making good healthy decisions. I give away things with the D.A.R.E. logo on them like footballs and basketballs to remind them of the program and what they learned. The D.A.R.E. program is very interactive to keep their attention and is used by 75% of schools in the United States. I also give each student a D.A.R.E. t-shirt at the end of the program. I teach the 6th grade class next. This D.A.R.E. program is about bullying and the effects of bullying. The class doesn't focus on preventing the bully from picking on people but focuses on more on teaching the bully how to react. It has been proven more effective to teach the program that way. I also teach a D.A.R.E. class in the 9th grade that focuses on RX/OTC medication usage. There seems to be a misconception that it is ok to take your friends prescription medication and I am trying to change that. The D.A.R.E. program is a lot of work with fundraising, planning, scheduling and teaching. I feel the program is worth the effort and the time. All of these programs are not just about the content they also let every student get to know me and also I get to know every one of them. It breaks the barriers down in a hurry and that is the goal of the SRO program.

The SRO program continues to grow and I strive to make it better and bigger every year. The program is also adapting to our ever changing world and will continue to do so. The incident numbers continue to go down and the prevention continues to go up and that is what we are looking for. The programs have made it possible for me to meet every single student in the school system and for them to feel comfortable around me. I look forward to another safe and productive year in Jamestown public schools.

RECORDS SECTION:

2013 WAS ANOTHER BUSY YEAR FOR THE RECORDS SECTION.

REPORTABLE CRIMES (THOSE THAT ARE REPORTED TO THE FBI) WERE DOWN FROM 1,170 IN 2013 AS COMPARED TO 1,319 IN 2012 BUT UP AS COMPARED TO 1,017 IN 2011. CRIMINAL MISCHIEF OFFENSES WERE DOWN AT 169 IN 2013 FROM 239 IN 2012. GROSS SEXUAL IMPOSITIONS WERE UP IN 2013 AT 23 OFFENSES COMPARED TO 15 IN 2012. DRUG VIOLATIONS REPORTED ARE ALSO DOWN WITH A DECREASE OF 208 VIOLATIONS IN 2013 AS COMPARED TO 229 IN 2012. ALL REPORTED THEFTS COMBINED WERE DOWN FROM 500 IN 2012 TO 436 IN 2013. THE MOST NOTED CHANGES WERE THEFT OF PROPERTY OFFENSES WERE DOWN BY 18, AND THEFT FROM MOTOR VEHICLE OFFENSES WERE DOWN BY 20 AND BURGLARIES WERE ALSO DOWN BY 11 IN 2013. OTHER INDIVIDUAL CATEGORIES OF CRIMES REPORTED WERE ONCE AGAIN VERY COMPARABLE TO THE NUMBER OF REPORTS RECEIVED IN 2012.

ADULT CRIMINAL ARRESTS ARE DOWN FROM 1,344 IN 2012 TO 1,215 IN 2013, A DECREASE OF 129. ALL REPORTED ANIMAL ARRESTS WERE DOWN FROM 79 IN 2012 TO 32 IN 2013. THERE WAS ALSO A NOTED DECREASE IN DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE ARRESTS WHICH WERE DOWN 44 IN 2013, POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA WAS DOWN BY 19 IN 2013 AND MINOR IN CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL ARRESTS WHICH WERE ALSO DOWN BY 30 IN 2013. THE OTHER CRIMINAL ARREST CATEGORY NUMBERS WERE COMPARABLE BETWEEN THE YEARS 2012 AND 2013.

JUVENILE REFERRALS WERE ALSO DOWN FROM 367 IN 2012 COMPARED TO 293 IN 2013. THE LARGEST DECREASE WAS IN CRIMINAL MISCHIEF REFERRALS WHICH WENT FROM 43 IN 2012 DOWN TO 14 IN 2013, A DIFFERENCE OF 29 REFERRALS. TOTAL REFERRALS FOR THEFT CHARGES WENT FROM 44 IN 2012 TO 20 IN 2013, A DECREASE OF 22. REFERRALS FOR ASSAULT CHARGES WENT FROM 20 IN 2012 TO 12 IN 2013, A DECREASE OF 8. REFERRALS FOR SEX CRIMES ARE UP, 6 IN 2013 AS COMPARED TO 5 IN 2012.






DUI Arrests by Age





James-Valley Special Operations Team

End of the Year Report for 2013

The James-Valley Special Operations Team (J-V S.O.T.) is a multi-agency combined Special Operations Team comprised of team members and resources from the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Valley City Police Department, and the Barnes County Sheriff's office. The J-V S.O.T. saw some changes in personnel during 2013 from a few of the agencies which provide team members and resources to the team.

The Jamestown Police Department saw a few changes to the team. Officer Ryan Goff made application for appointment to the team. Officer Goff has been employed with the Police Department since August of 2012 and was unanimously appointed to the team. Cpl. Robert Schlenvogt stepped down from the team in the Summer of 2013, after being a dedicated team member since the inception of the team 19 years ago. Officer Joseph Stadler and Officer Michael Germain also resigned from the team and their employment with the Jamestown Police Department in 2013.

The Valley City Police Department saw changes in personnel which they have assigned to the Special Operations Team. Officer Steve Loibl resigned from the Valley City Police Department and he was hired by the Barnes County Sheriff's Office. Deputy Loibl remains an active member of the James-Valley Special Operations Team, as Barnes County Sheriff's Deputy. Deputy Loibl joins Deputy Patrick Sand as the 2 members of the Special Operations Team from Barnes County. Officer Randy Schmidt also resigned from the Valley City Police Department and he is no longer a member of the James-Valley Special Operations Team.

The Stutsman County Sheriff's Office did not see any changes in the personnel which they have assigned to the James-Valley Special Operations Team.

The Jamestown Police Department currently have 5 operators, 1 negotiator, and 1 secretary assigned to the James Valley Special Operations Team. The entire team is currently comprised of 12 tactical operators, in the following areas: command, entry, sniper, and chemical munitions; 1 sworn negotiator with a total of 7 negotiators when utilizing the James River Correctional Center Crisis Negotiations Team, and the Special Operations Team Secretary/Scribe. Under the existing understanding of the combined team, primary command of the team still falls under the Jamestown Police Department. Funding responsibility falls on each agency to provide equipment and training for their respective officers assigned to the team or if state or federal grant funding becomes available for team equipment.

Each year, the James-Valley Special Operations Teams main focus is to continue providing quality specialized trainings unique to SWAT teams and to enhance team cohesion. To meet

this goal, many team members attended several specialized trainings to enhance the team's capabilities when encountering situations during callouts in 2013. Officer Ryan Goff and Deputy Sgt. Ramone Gumke (S.C.S.O.) attended a S.W.A. T. basic operator's course in Minot, ND. Officer Michael Germain and Deputy Sgt. Ramone Gumke (S.C.S.O.) both attended a Sniper's basic training course in Grand Forks, ND. Deputy Major Jason Falk (S.C.S.O.), Deputy Sgt. Ramone Gumke (S.C.S.O.), and Deputy Casey Yunck (S.C.S.O.) all attended an advanced Sniper's training course which was hosted in rural Jamestown, by the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office. Officer Michael Lucht attended a "National Tactical Officers Association" training course to certify him as an instructor in Less-Lethal Projectiles, Flash/Sound Diversionary Device, and chemical agents, in Fargo, ND. Sgt. Justin Blinsky, Cpl. Nick Hardy, Cpl. Sidney Mann, and Deputy Major Jason Falk (S.C.S.O.) all attended a "National Tactical Officers Association" training course on School and Workplace Violence in Minneapolis, MN. These trainings helped to give attendees a better understanding on how to deal with and resolve situations successfully, by using the knowledge and tactics they learned from these specialized training courses.

Currently, the James-Valley Special Operations Team is a North Dakota Peace Officers Association Special Operations Committee (N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C.) certified team. The James-Valley Special Operations Team is one of only 6 certified regional response SWAT teams in the state of North Dakota. There are several strict requirements set forth by the S.O.C. which must be met in order to be considered a certified team. Some of these requirements include: staffing levels, having a negotiations team, specialized trainings for team members, a minimum of 96 hours of team training each year, and equipment requirements. The J-V S.O.T. continues to meet these requirements, which is an asset to our community and surrounding area. By being recognized as a certified team, the J-V S.O.T. can be called upon to assist our department or surrounding agencies in critical situations. Those situations can include: armed and/or barricaded subjects, high risk search/arrest warrants, hostage situations, search/rescue of victims, suspects, or dangerous offenders, and any other detail which cannot be completed successfully without utilizing the resources which the James-Valley Special Operations Team can provide during an event. As a certified team, we can be called upon to respond to any location, but will primarily provide support in the 9 surrounding counties to Stutsman County. If we do travel outside the jurisdiction of any participating agency of the team, we are eligible to receive reimbursement for the expenses occurred by the team/agencies. This reimbursement can include the team members' wages, mileage, food, lodging, equipment expenses, and wages of the officers who will need to fill the vacancies left by the officers deploying with the team. The N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C. provides training and training funds to certified teams.

As mentioned before, a minimum of 96 hours of team training must be completed each year. This year we continued to develop difficult training curriculums for team trainings, to try and

challenge team member's capabilities. These trainings also help to develop unity and cohesion with team members, which is an essential component to be a successful team. We continue to alternate training sites between Jamestown, Valley City, and other rural locations and ranges, which help provide a suitable setting for quality training.

Equipment is always a priority when looking at what immediate needs the team has to continue to operate successfully and safely. The James Valley Special Operations Team was awarded grant funding for a remote robot in 2012. The James Valley Special Operations Team took possession of the robot, successfully trained with the robot, and implemented it into resolving situations, when the team was called upon in 2013. Team members realized there were still some limitations to the remote robot, so further funding was looked for to purchase attachments to the robot to resolve these limitations. In late 2013, a grant became available and was applied for through the North Dakota Department of Emergency Services. The Special Operations Team was only able to apply for this grant because we are a certified regional response SWAT team. The team was awarded grant funding to buy a manipulator arm for the robot, so it can open doors and give better views with a higher platform camera system. The grant also allowed for a mobile radio to be purchased and installed into the Police Department Ranger. This will allow for better communication when utilizing this vehicle. This equipment should arrive in early 2014.

During 2013, the James-Valley Special Operations Team was activated 6 times.

On 01/01/13, at 0230 hrs., the Special Operations Team was activated to respond to a residence in Valley City, for an armed barricaded subject with previous felony convictions, to execute a high-risk search and arrest warrant. The subject was making threats to a known acquaintance and was prohibited from possessing firearms. The immediate neighborhood was evacuated, due to the threat this suspect presented. After several hours, the subject came out of his residence and was taken into custody without incident.

On 05/25/13, at 0957 hrs., the Special Operations Team was used to execute a high-risk search warrant, after the patrol division responded to a call of a suicidal male hours earlier, at a residence in Jamestown. The reporting party to this incident stated the male subject was intoxicated, making suicidal threats, and believed she heard the sounds of gunshot(s) coming from the basement, as she contacted the Police Department. The reporting party fled the residence and the police arrived a short time later. After monitoring the residence for several hours, a search warrant was obtained. The team assembled and executed the search warrant successfully and the subject was taken into custody for evaluation.

On 07/13/13, at 1729 hrs., the Special Operations Team was activated for a volatile domestic violence situation at a residence in Valley City, ND. The male suspect had a history of violence,

believed to be in possession of firearm(s), history of hostility against police, and was probably drinking. The female resident was safe at the Police Department, but the male suspect was believed to be inside the female's residence. The male suspect had a restraining order prohibiting contact with the female subject who lived at the house or for coming within 200 yards of the house. The suspect did not have any right to be at the residence and the resident did not feel safe without having her house cleared by Police first. The investigation and incident was very fluid and the team was activated, in case the subject was inside the house and/or if entry had to be made. The investigation continued and further information showed the male suspect had likely left the residence and was not in the area. The decision was made for the team to make entry into the house, to verify the residence was not occupied. The team cleared the house successfully, without any further action taken.


On 10/10/13, at 2313 hrs., the Special Operations Team was activated for an intoxicated male barricaded inside a building, in Sanborn, ND. The male suspect had been involved in an altercation at the Sanborn Bar a short time earlier. The male had been removed from the bar, but had returned a short time later. He had armed himself with an ax, which he used to throw through a window into the bar, almost striking another patron. Barnes County Sheriff's Office obtained a search and arrest warrant for committing the felony level offense. The team utilized several resources available to them. The team eventually made entry into the building, located the subject hiding in the basement, and took him into custody.

On 10/23/13, at 0830 hrs., the Special Operations Team was activated to assist Stutsman County Corrections in completing a massive search of their full facility. The massive search included moving inmates out of their cells to other locations within the secure facility, conducting thorough searches of the facility, and to maintain order of the facility throughout the process.

On 11/03/13, at 1941 hrs., the Special Operations Team was activated to respond to the Sorkness Center at the University of Jamestown campus. The patrol division had responded to a call from a female reporting an unknown male was inside the building and the male had told her he had a gun. The female fled the building and the male suspect was believed to still be inside the Sorkness Center and armed. The patrol division surrounded the building and requested the Special Operations Team respond to make entry into the building. Prior to the team arrival, the male suspect was taken into custody. The team arrived a short time later and assisted in completing a search of the grounds for any evidence left behind, including any weapons.

We continue to strive to provide a well-trained and equipped response team when called upon in Jamestown and surrounding areas, to handle and resolve critical incidences, as they arise.

STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2013

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy Jamey Overvold, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 1 ½ years, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 6 years and is stationed in Barnes County. Officer Mike Lucht, with the Jamestown Police Department, has been assigned to the Task Force and has been a member for 3 years. Special Agent Troy Kelly has been supervising the Task Force for 1 year. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 85 cases in 2013, which was down from last year but higher than the last few years. The Task Force initiated 59 cases and assisted other agencies with 26 cases. Of the 59 initiated cases, the Task Force had 54 arrests, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2013, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 352 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$140,800. Those numbers are more than twice as high as last year. Task Force also seized approximately 115 grams of synthetic drugs which is over three times what was seized in the prior year.

In 2013, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 45 grams of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$6,750. Although this number is down from last year, methamphetamine use in the area continues to be a problem.

In 2013, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 272 dosage units of various prescription controlled substances including morphine, fentanyl, oxycodone, hydrocodone, tramadol, and various others. Prescription drug abuse continues to be an ongoing trend in our area and across the state.

In 2013, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 40 grams of cocaine with an approximate street value of \$8,000.

In 2013, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 48 dosage units of LSD with an approximate street value of \$720.

During 2013, the Task Force, other jurisdictions, and DEA worked in a cooperative effort to conduct three separate federal conspiracy investigations. All of those are still ongoing so the total numbers of those indicted are unknown at this time. The Task Force also conducted three separate investigations with ATF. Those are also still ongoing so total numbers are unknown at this time.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force.

In summary, in 2013 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 85 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, synthetics, LSD, cocaine, and prescription controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE

2013 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:

IN 2013, THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 1045 CALLS PERTAINING TO ANIMALS. THE MAJORITY OF THESE CALLS WERE TO COMPLAIN ABOUT ANIMALS AT LARGE OR BEING A NUISANCE. 28 OF THESE CALLS WERE REGARDING PEOPLE BEING BITTEN BY ANIMALS. 22 CALLS WERE TO INVESTIGATE CRUELTY TO ANIMALS. THESE CALLS, ALONG WITH ROUTINE PATROL, RESULTED IN 207 ANIMALS BEING IMPOUNDED (113 dogs, 90 cats, 1 sheep, 2 rabbits, and 1 python). THESE ANIMALS WERE HANDLED AS FOLLOWS:

THERE WERE 254 DOG LICENSES AND 63 CAT LICENSES ISSUED IN 2013 AS WELL AS PERMITS FOR 21 PRIVATE KENNELS AND 0 COMMERCIAL KENNELS. THE TOTAL COST OF VETERINARY FEES IN 2013 IS \$392.50. THIS INCLUDES TESTING COST FOR RABIES EVALUATION.
