PUBLIC RELATIONS:

IDENTITY THEFT AND SCAM EDUCATION CONTINUE TO BE VERY POPULAR AND REQUESTED CLASSES ARE GIVEN BY DETECTIVE SERGEANT LEROY GROSS.

OTHER PRESENTATIONS WERE GIVEN TO VARIOUS GROUPS COVERING TRAFFIC LAWS, DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, DUTIES OF A POLICE OFFICER, SEXUAL ASSAULT OR OTHER POLICE RELATED TOPICS AS REQUESTED. AT THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT WE FEEL IT IS NECESSARY TO BE INVOLVED WITH THE COMMUNITY AND INTERACT WITH THEM AND WE WILL CONTINUE TO DO THAT.

POLICE DEPARTMENT TOURS-OFFERS THE OPPORTUNITY TO BECOME INFORMED ON THE OPERATION OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, DISPATCH CENTER AND CORRECTIONAL CENTER.

GAMING ENFORCEMENT:

THE DEPARTMENT'S GAMING ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM WORKS TOWARDS THE GOAL OF ENSURING THAT THOSE WHO CONDUCT OR PLAY THE GAMES OF CHANCE IN JAMESTOWN ARE PROTECTED BY THE STATE GAMING RULES. TO ACCOMPLISH THESE GOALS THE POLICE DEPARTMENT, WORKING WITH THE STATE GAMING OFFICE, REVIEW COMPLAINTS OF GAMING VIOLATIONS.

BICYCLES:

IN 2014 THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 21 BICYCLE LICENSES SOLD. THERE WERE 26 BIKES REPORTED STOLEN WITH A TOTAL OF 51 ABANDONED OR STOLEN BIKES RECOVERED IN 2014.

K-9 ACTIVITY:

K-9 ACTIVITIES REFER TO ANY CALL REQUESTING ASSISTANCE FROM THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT K-9 UNIT. REQUESTS CAN BE MADE AT ANYTIME FOR ASSISTANCE IN NARCOTIC SEARCHES OF VEHICLES, RESIDENCES, AND BUILDINGS, AREA SEARCHES FOR EVIDENCE OF A CRIME, AND TRACKING OF LOST PERSONS OR SUSPECTS IN CRIMES.

K-9 BLAZE, A BLACK LABRADOR RETRIEVER, IS STILL WITH THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT. HE HAS BEEN WITH THE DEPARTMENT SINCE AUGUST OF 2008. HE WAS PURCHASED THROUGH DONATIONS BY AREA RESIDENTS AND LOCAL BUSINESSES. SERGEANT MANN AND K-9 BLAZE ARE ASSIGNED TO THE UNIFORM DIVISION WORKING 7PM TO 7AM.

IN 2014 SERGEANT MANN AND K-9 BLAZE COMPLETED 20 CALLS FOR SERVICE INCLUDING 3 SEARCHES AT THE JAMESTOWN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, 1 SEARCH AT THE JAMES RIVER CORRECTIONAL CENTER, 1 SEARCH AT CARRINGTON PUBLIC SCHOOLS , 9 VEHICLE SEARCHES, AND 8 SEARCHES AT RESIDENCES . THE K-9 UNIT WAS USED IN CONJUNCTION WITH SEVERAL AGENCIES INCLUDING THE STUTSMAN COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, DRUG TASK FORCE, JAMES RIVER CORRECTIONAL CENTER, AND CARRINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT.

2014 SCHOOL PROGRAMS:

THE JUVENILE OFFICER OF THE JAMESTOWN POLICE DEPARTMENT GAVE 81 PRESENTATIONS TO SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN IN 2014. THE FOLLOWING PROGRAMS WERE INCLUDED IN THOSE PRESENTATIONS.

MEET A POLICE OFFICER: STUDENTS MEET A POLICE OFFICER AND LEARN ABOUT GOOD CITIZENSHIP, RESPONSIBILITY AND THE DUTIES OF POLICE OFFICERS.

BEWARE OF STRANGERS: INSTRUCTIONS TO STUDENTS ABOUT SAFETY WITH STRANGERS. TOPICS INCLUDE WHO A STRANGER IS, RIDES FROM STRANGERS AND GOOD AND BAD TOUCHES.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY: INSTRUCTIONS ON HALLOWEEN SAFETY RULES, TOPICS INCLUDE TRAFFIC SAFETY, COSTUMES, TREATS, STRANGER SAFETY AND HALLOWEEN COURTESY.

CRIME PREVENTION: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH CRIME PREVENTION, CRIME DETECTION AND CRIME REPORTING. TOPICS INCLUDE THE JOB OF A POLICE OFFICER, HOW TO DETECT, PREVENT AND REPORT CRIMES.

BIKE SAFETY: PROGRAM DESIGNED TO TEACH SAFE BIKE RIDING. TOPICS INCLUDE BIKE TRAFFIC SAFETY RULES, ACCIDENT PREVENTION, LOCKING AND LICENSING BIKES.

HOME ALONE SAFETY: REVIEWS THE SAFETY SKILLS CHILDREN NEED WHEN THEY ARE HOME ALONE. TOPICS INCLUDE CRIME PREVENTION, FIRE PREVENTION, FIRST AID AND THE USE OF EMERGENCY PHONE NUMBER 911.

CRIME PREVENTION TRADING CARD PROGRAM: THE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES ITS PARTICIPATION IN THIS WORTHWHILE CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAM. DURING THE BASEBALL SEASON, EACH OFFICER RECEIVES MINNESOTA TWINS CARDS TO HAND OUT TO THE YOUTH OF JAMESTOWN. THE PROGRAM CONTINUES TO DEVELOP POSITIVE CONTACT BETWEEN OUR OFFICERS AND THE YOUTH OF OUR CITY.

ARSON AWARENESS PROGRAM: AN INFORMATIVE LOOK AT THE DANGERS INVOLVED IN THE MISUSE OF LIGHTERS AND MATCHES. STUDENTS ARE REMINDED THAT MATCHES AND LIGHTERS ARE DANGEROUS TOOLS AND WHEN THEY ARE MISUSED, THEY CAN CAUSE INJURY, DEATH AND THE DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY. STUDENTS ARE ADVISED TO RECEIVE PROPER INSTRUCTION ON HOW TO USE MATCHES AND LIGHTERS FROM AN ADULT. EXAMPLES OF THE MISUSE OF FIRE ARE GIVEN ALONG WITH SAFETY INFORMATION ON HOW TO PREVENT FIRES.

The second half of the 2013-14 school year was about the same as the previous year. The incidents I am dealing with are drug possession, paraphernalia, disorderly conduct, unruly juvenile, minor in consumption or possession and assaults. The referrals have leveled off and around the 15 mark is where we are at per semester. Every year since the SRO program was started in 2009 the numbers have been steadily decreasing with it now leveling off in the past two years. The main goal is still to bridge the gap between the police department and the kids and I can say we have done that. It took six years for me to be a normal fixture in the schools and the kids all know why I am there and accept it. I have multiple students that come to my office every day to talk about things and 99% of the kids recognize me even out of uniform. All the preventive measures are in place and are being effective at reducing incidents and making it easier for me to communicate with the students. The text a tip program is still in place and is being used to report anything from drug and alcohol use to assaults that are about to take place.

In the first half of the 2014-15 school year the referrals went up a little. Jamestown schools are seeing growth and some of the kids that are coming into the district kept me really busy for the first couple months of the year. I could count the students I was having problems with on one hand but they raised the disorderly conduct referrals up in the time that they were here. It took a few months to get these students sorted out and put in the places where they would be best educated and that was not here in Jamestown. The referrals are back to the level they always are and everything is running smoothly again. My involvement with students out of school is always on the rise. I am making more visits to homes at the request of parents and also spending more time of Facebook trying to stop incidents from being brought into the schools. I am still working with the counselors on a weekly basis and it is a good preventive tool to share information that would be helpful to both of us. I still have the option of not giving a student a referral if I don't think it's going to help and maybe using that student in the future. I know all these students because of the education programs I run and also because I have seen them grow up for the last six years. Everybody makes mistakes and a break at the right moment can go a long way.

This was the second year of juvenile drug court for Stutsman/Barnes County. I am the representative from the Jamestown Police Department. Juvenile's get recommended from the juvenile officers and have to fit certain criteria to be in the program. The team meets every Wednesday to discuss how the juvenile has done during the week. The juvenile is given things to accomplish during the week and if they do the tasks they are rewarded and if they don't they are given sanctions. The juvenile's are in the program for a year and can graduate out. If they fail the tasks they are punished all the way up to being kicked out of the program and being put onto the custody of DJS.

Since the SRO program started in 2009 the incident numbers have been decreasing every year. During the 2009-10 school year there were 136 incidents and only 40 activity hours. During the 2012-13 school year there were 40 incidents and 225 activity hours. The numbers have leveled off to around 30 referrals a year and considering we have over 2000 students that number is reasonable. This year we added a call for service in dispatch. The call is called SRO prevention and education. The call is made every time I get called to a school or am out for a prevention class. From August 22nd 2013 to May 22nd

2014 I made that call for service 178 times. I responded to 8 cases of child abuse or neglect that were reported in the schools. I taught 4 public relation classes to adults in the schools, responded to 16 disorderly conducts and 15 unruly juveniles. I still attend sporting events such as football, hockey, basketball, volleyball and baseball. I attend these events for many reasons. I am asked by students, parents and staff to attend them. I also attend events for safety reasons and with all the school violence that has happened in the past 15 years I feel it is important for the Jamestown Police Department to be visible. Every time I attend one of the sporting events a call for service is made with dispatch called SRO sporting events. That call was made 63 times from August 2013 to May 2014. The total number of times I made a call for service that was school related during the 2013-14 school year was 284 times. I am being used more and more each year and my responsibilities are growing. The working relationship that I have with the administrators and all the staff shows we are working together to make Jamestown Schools the safest environment for our kids to learn and succeed.

My prevention programs are as big as they have ever been. I teach 4th Amendment rights to the 9th grade civics classes. It gives the students a chance to ask about search and seizure and the rights they have. I teach seat belt safety in the 3rd grade classrooms. The class teaches the students how important seat belts are and why they should wear them.

The DARE program is by far the biggest program I teach in the schools. It starts in Kindergarten where I talk to the student about summer safety. We talk for around 30 minutes about bike safety, crosswalks and about being a buddy while playing outside. This is also an introduction to me and what I do in the schools. The next class I see is the 5th grade. This is the core program for DARE and the class is one hour a week for nine weeks. The program focuses on peer pressure, bullying, resistance strategies, stress and making good healthy choices. I give away things with the DARE logo on them like footballs and basketballs to remind them of the program and what they learned. I could give them pieces of paper and pamphlets with DARE information but they would get thrown away and it is a waste. Giving them things they enjoy doing with the DARE logo makes more sense for them to see the logo and remember what they had learned. I teach the 6th grade next. This DARE program is about bullying and the effects of bullying. The class doesn't focus on preventing the bully from picking on people but focuses more on teaching the people being bullied how to react. The DARE program is very interactive to keep their attention and is used by 75% of the schools in the United States. Each student receives a DARE t-shirt at the end of the program. Not only is it about the content of the DARE program but this gives me a chance to see these students once a week for nine weeks. I get to know them and they get to know me. The DARE program is a lot of work with fundraising, planning, scheduling and teaching. I feel the program is worth the effort and time. It breaks down barriers and that is the goal of the SRO program.

The SRO program continues to grow and I strive to make it bigger and better every year. The program is also adapting to our ever changing world and will continue to do so. The referral numbers continue to go down and the prevention continues to go up. The programs have made it possible for me to meet every single student in the school system and for them to feel comfortable around me.

We need to continue to be proactive in school safety by adding safety features to our schools. We are ahead of most school districts in North Dakota with the addition of cameras, buzzers systems and locked doors. Money and tight budgets have made it difficult to do any more but hopefully in the future I can continue with the safety plan. I continue to attend trainings on school safety and security and make sure we have the latest up to date information. In 2014 I was named the North Dakota director for DARE and attended the annual meeting in Dallas, TX. I look forward to another safe and productive year as School Resource Officer.

RECORDS SECTION:

2014 WAS ANOTHER BUSY YEAR FOR THE RECORD'S SECTION.

REPORTABLE CRIMES (THOSE THAT ARE REPORTED TO THE FBI) WERE UP. THERE WERE 1,346 IN 2014, 1,170 IN 2013 AND 1,319 IN 2012. CRIMINAL MISCHIEF OFFENSES WERE UP AT 226 IN 2014 COMPARED TO 169 IN 2013. GROSS SEXUAL IMPOSITIONS WERE DOWN IN 2013 AT 10 OFFENSES COMPARED TO 23 IN 2013. DRUG VIOLATIONS REPORTED ARE ALSO UP WITH AN INCREASE OF 241 VIOLATIONS IN 2014 AS COMPARED TO 208 IN 2013. ALL REPORTED THEFTS COMBINED WERE UP FROM 541 IN 2014 AS COMPARED TO 436 IN 2013. THE MOST NOTED CHANGES ARE POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA OFFENSES HAVE INCREASED BY 57, THEFT FROM BUILDING OFFENSES HAVE INCREASED BY 24 AND THEFT OF PROPERTY HAVE INCREASED BY 19 IN 2014. THE ONLY SIGNIFICANT DECREASE WAS WITH SIMPLE ASSAULT OFFENSES GOING FROM 92 REPORTABLE OFFENSES IN 2013 TO 62 IN 2014. OTHER INDIVIDUAL CATEGORIES OF CRIMES REPORTED WERE ONCE AGAIN VERY COMPARABLE TO THE NUMBER OF REPORTS RECEIVED IN 2013.

ADULT CRIMINAL ARRESTS ARE UP FROM 1,215 IN 2013 TO 1,250 IN 2014, AN INCREASE OF 35. ALL REPORTED ANIMAL ARRESTS WERE DOWN FROM 28 IN 2014 TO 32 IN 2013, AS WELL AS A NOTED DECREASE IN DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE ARRESTS WHICH WERE DOWN 19 IN 2014. ARRESTS FOR POSSESSION OF DRUG PARAPHERNALIA INCREASED BY 33 IN 2014 AND MINOR IN CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL ARRESTS WHICH WERE ALSO DOWN BY 30 IN 2014. THE OTHER CRIMINAL ARREST CATEGORY NUMBERS WERE COMPARABLE BETWEEN THE YEARS 2013 AND 2014.

JUVENILE REFERRALS WERE ALSO DOWN FROM 293 IN 2013 COMPARED TO 235 IN 2014. THE LARGEST DECREASE WAS IN CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOL BY MINOR REFERRALS WHICH WENT FROM 28 IN 2013 DOWN TO 15 IN 2014, A DIFFERENCE OF 13 REFERRALS. TOTAL REFERRALS FOR THEFT CHARGES WENT FROM 20 IN 2013 TO 28 IN 2014, AN INCREASE OF 8. REFERRALS FOR ASSAULT CHARGES WENT FROM 12 IN 2013 TO 11 IN 2014, A DECREASE OF 1. REFERRALS FOR SEX CRIMES WENT FROM 6 IN 2013 TO 3 IN 2014, A DECREASE OF 3.





DUI Arrests by Sex 2014





DUI Arrests by Age 2014





James-Valley Special Operations Team

End of the Year Report for 2014

The James-Valley Special Operations Team (J-V S.O.T.) is a multi-agency combined Special Operations Team comprised of team members and resources from the Jamestown Police Department, Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, Valley City Police Department, and the Barnes County Sheriff's office. The J-V S.O.T. saw some changes in personnel during 2014 from a few of the agencies which provide team members and resources to the team.

The Jamestown Police Department saw a few changes to the team. Officer Brian Davis made application for appointment to the team. Officer Davis has been employed with the Police Department since September of 2013 and was unanimously appointed to the team.

The Valley City Police Department did not see changes in personnel which they have assigned to the Special Operations Team in 2014.

The Stutsman County Sheriff's Office did see changes in the personnel which they have assigned to the James-Valley Special Operations Team. Sgt. Ramone Gumke resigned from the sheriff's office and subsequently resigned from the team. Deputy Casey Yunck has been given a dedicated assignment as a Sniper on the team. Tyler Falk, who works as a reserve deputy for the sheriff's office and is a licensed peace officer through North Dakota Parole and Probation has been unanimously appointed to the team.

The Barnes County Sheriff's Office added one new member to the team. Deputy Jed Reile was added to the team in 2014.

The Jamestown Police Department currently have 4 operators and 1 secretary assigned to the James Valley Special Operations Team. The entire team is currently comprised of 11 tactical operators, in the following areas: command, entry, sniper, and chemical munitions; 7 negotiators when utilizing the James River Correctional Center Crisis Negotiations Team, and the Special Operations Team Secretary/Scribe. Under the existing understanding of the combined team, primary command of the team still falls under the Jamestown Police Department. Funding responsibility falls on each agency to provide equipment and training for their respective officers assigned to the team or if state or federal grant funding becomes available for team equipment.

Each year, the James-Valley Special Operations Teams main focus is to continue providing quality specialized trainings unique to SWAT teams and to enhance team cohesion. To meet this goal, some team members attended several specialized trainings to enhance the team's capabilities when encountering situations during callouts in 2014. Officer Brian Davis (JPD) and

Deputy Jed Reile (B.C.S.O.) completed a Basic SWAT operator's class in Fargo, ND, in May 2014. Sgt. Dana Rustebakke completed a chemical munitions course to certify him as an instructor in Less-Lethal Projectiles, Flash/Sound Diversionary Device, and chemical agents. Along with these trainings, the Special Operations team completed their annual 96 hours of team trainings during the course of 2014, to remain a certified SWAT team. All of these trainings have helped to give attendees a better understanding on how to deal with and resolve situations successfully, by using the knowledge and tactics they learned from these specialized training courses.

Currently, the James-Valley Special Operations Team is a North Dakota Peace Officers Association Special Operations Committee (N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C.) certified team. The James-Valley Special Operations Team is one of only 6 certified regional response SWAT teams in the state of North Dakota. There are several strict requirements set forth by the S.O.C. which must be met in order to be considered a certified team. Some of these requirements include: staffing levels, having a negotiations team, specialized trainings for team members, a minimum of 96 hours of team training each year, and equipment requirements. The J-V S.O.T. continues to meet these requirements, which is an asset to our community and surrounding area. By being recognized as a certified team, the J-V S.O.T. can be called upon to assist our department or surrounding agencies in critical situations. Those situations can include: armed and/or barricaded subjects, high risk search/arrest warrants, hostage situations, search/rescue of victims, suspects, or dangerous offenders, and any other detail which cannot be completed successfully without utilizing the resources which the James-Valley Special Operations Team can provide during an event. As a certified team, we can be called upon to respond to any location, but will primarily provide support in the 7 surrounding counties to Stutsman County. If we do travel outside the jurisdiction of any participating agency of the team, we are eligible to receive reimbursement for the expenses occurred by the team/agencies. This reimbursement can include the team members' wages, mileage, food, lodging, equipment expenses, and wages of the officers who will need to fill the vacancies left by the officers deploying with the team. The N.D.P.O.A. S.O.C. provides training and training funds to certified teams.

As mentioned before, a minimum of 96 hours of team training must be completed each year. This year we continued to develop difficult training curriculums for team trainings, to try and challenge team member's capabilities. These trainings also help to develop unity and cohesion with team members, which is an essential component to be a successful team. We continue to alternate training sites between Jamestown, Valley City, and other rural locations and ranges, which help provide a suitable setting for quality training.

Equipment is always a priority when looking at what immediate needs the team has to continue to operate successfully and safely. The James Valley Special Operations Team was awarded grant funding for night vision equipment, which will be purchased in early 2015.

During 2014, the James-Valley Special Operations Team was activated 3 times.

On 02/28/14, the J-V S.O.T was used to execute a high-risk search warrant in rural Lamoure County, ND. The team was utilized to assist the regional Drug Task Force, to provide better assets, equipment, and more highly-trained officers, to execute the search warrant, in this rural setting, which posed a significant risk to the safety of the officers. There was substantial evidence to support the probability of officers encountering armed suspects inside this residence, who could potentially be under the influence of drugs. The search warrant was executed without any injuries to the suspects or officers.

On 06/18/14, the J-V S.O.T. was used to execute a high risk search warrant in the southeast part of Jamestown. We were again called upon to assist the regional Drug Task Force, to provide better assets, equipment, and additional high-trained personnel, to execute the search warrant. There was supporting probable cause to believe officers would encounter armed suspect(s) inside the residence, who could potentially be under the influence of drugs. The search warrant was executed and completed, without any injuries, while maintaining the safety and well-being of the citizens of Jamestown.

On 10/09/14, the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office requested assistance from the James Valley S.O.T., at a rural farmstead near Kensal, ND. The Sheriff's Office had received a report of a resident returning to his farmstead, finding multiple intruders inside the residence, and in the process of defending his property, he shot 2 suspects. Based on the rural terrain, the significant risk to officer safety, and the need for manpower, the J-V Special Operations Team responded. After receiving additional information and developing an operational plan, the S.O.T. entered and searched the entire farm yard and residence. No suspects were found and the investigation was turned over to the Sheriff's Office .

As a part-time specialized team, we continue to strive to provide a well-trained and equipped response team when called upon in Jamestown and surrounding areas, to handle and resolve critical incidences, as they arise.

STUTSMAN COUNTY NARCOTICS TASK FORCE YEAR END REPORT 2014

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional and multi-agency Task Force covering the counties of Stutsman, Barnes, LaMoure, Eddy, and Foster. The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is dedicated to the identification, investigation, and prosecution of the individuals involved in the use, manufacturing, and distribution of controlled substances.

The Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force is made up of four (4) sworn Law Enforcement Officers. Deputy Jamey Overvold, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 2 ½ years, Deputy Doug Muske, with the Stutsman County Sheriff's Office, has been a member for 7 years and is stationed in Barnes County. Officer Ryan Goff, with the Jamestown Police Department, has been assigned to the Task Force and has been a member for the last 6 months. Special Agent Troy Kelly has been supervising the Task Force for 2 years. The officers are assigned to work certain areas, but the officers have been deputized in all five (5) of the counties that are part of the Task Force and must share the responsibility for all of the counties involved.

The Task Force had a total of 87 cases in 2014, which was up from last year. The Task Force initiated 59 cases and assisted other agencies with 23 cases. Of the 64 initiated cases, the Task Force had 36 arrests, and many still pending, related to drug related offenses such as Possession of Controlled Substances, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Manufacture of a Controlled Substance, Delivery of a Controlled Substance, and Criminal Conspiracy to Deliver a Controlled Substance.

In 2014, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 126 ounces of marijuana with an approximate street value of \$60,480.

In 2014, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 83 grams of methamphetamine with an approximate street value of \$16,600. This number is nearly twice as high as last year's number showing the continuing rise of methphetamines in the area.

In 2014, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 130 dosage units of various prescription controlled substances including morphine, fentanyl, oxycodone, hydrocodone, tramadol, and various others. This number is considerably down from last year but included in that number is numerous units of MDMA and Ecstasy which were not seized in the previous year.

In 2014, the Task Force seized/purchased approximately 1 gram of crack/cocaine with an approximate street value of \$200.

During 2014, the Task Force, other jurisdictions, and DEA worked in a cooperative effort to conduct three separate federal conspiracy investigations. All of those are still ongoing so the total numbers of those indicted are unknown at this time. The Task Force also conducted two separate investigations with ATF. Those are also still ongoing so total numbers are unknown at this time.

Besides initiating/assisting on cases, Task Force continues to provide free teaching and training in the school systems, businesses, and special interest groups throughout the area covered by the Task Force.

In summary, in 2014 the Stutsman County Narcotics Task Force initiated/assisted 87 cases involving the seizure/purchase of marijuana, methamphetamine, MDMA, Ecstasy, crack/cocaine, and prescription controlled substances. The Task Force removed a substantial quantity of illegal narcotics, and distributors/manufacturers of those narcotics, from the streets and communities in Stutsman County, LaMoure County, Barnes County, Eddy County, and Foster County.

*Note: Several cases are still at the State Lab of Toxicology being analyzed. Actual weights would be higher. Several cases have yet to be forwarded for formal complaints. Actual arrests would be higher.

2014 ANIMAL CONTROL REPORT:

IN 2014, THERE WERE A TOTAL OF 1090 CALLS PERTAINING TO ANIMALS. THE MAJORITY OF THESE CALLS WERE TO COMPLAIN ABOUT ANIMALS AT LARGE OR BEING A NUISANCE. 27 OF THESE CALLS WERE REGARDING PEOPLE BEING BITTEN BY ANIMALS. 26 CALLS WERE TO INVESTIGATE CRUELTY TO ANIMALS. THESE CALLS FOR SERVICE CALLS, ALONG WITH ROUTINE PATROL, RESULTED IN 203 ANIMALS BEING IMPOUNDED (97 dogs, 102 cats, 1 rabbit, and 3 ducks). THESE ANIMALS WERE HANDLED AS FOLLOWS:
